It's my honor to launch Solas Nua's January to June 2023 program with this beautiful brochure, which highlights all of the multi-disciplinary offerings that we have lined up for you.

A spotlight on women will kick off the year with *Imbolc*, a new work written and performed by Irish folk singer-songwriter Maija Sofia. Commissioned by Solas Nua especially for St. Brigid's Day, Maija will perform this piece live for the first time in Washington, D.C. We are also delighted to partner again with Dublin based theatre company Fishamble, to present Margaret McAuliffe's award winning *The Humours of Bandon*, the story of Annie, a 16-year-old Dubliner, as she charts us through the various successes and disappointments of her Irish Dancing life.

We will also focus on Northern Ireland, as we move into year two of the Norman Houston Project, dedicated to the memory of the former Director of the Northern Ireland Bureau in the US. The project includes the Capital Irish Film Festival's Award for the best short film from Northern Ireland, and the Norman Houston Multi-disciplinary Commissioning Award.

We continue to build on some of our old favorites, including Irish Book Day which will be at the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Library in downtown D.C., our beloved Play Reading Series and the annual Capital Irish Film Festival, now in its 17th year. We also bring you a smorgasbord of online offerings, including the ever popular CIFF@Home with NYU DC Dialogues.

As always, Solas Nua is committed to bringing the best of contemporary Irish arts to D.C. and are deeply thankful to our valued supporters, your help goes directly into making projects happen. Our tagline is 'New Irish Arts' and we are proud to share all that is inspiring about globally diverse Ireland.

Solas Nua is delighted to present *Imbolc*, a new work written and performed by Irish folk singer-songwriter from County Galway, Maija Sofia. Commissioned by Solas Nua especially for St. Brigid's Day (Imbolc), for this unique event, Maija Sofia will perform this new piece live for the first time in the intimate, modernist setting of St. Thomas's Parish, an Episcopal church in Washington, D.C.

While working on this commission, Maija Sofia considered St. Brigid as a mystic, pagan feminist icon; a figure through which old Irish traditions, wisdoms and practices persisted in spite of the patriarchy of the Catholic Church in Ireland. Taking the 'Cailleach' (divine hag or witch) as a starting point, Maija looks at how St Brigid symbolizes a kind of secret resistant undercurrent of feminine, mystic and ecological forms of knowledge. The new piece will be performed alongside Maija's other songs that deal with themes of feminist historical narratives and alternate forms of knowledge as well as older folk songs that contain similar themes of nature and witchcraft.

Solas Nua looks forward to welcoming Maija Sofia to a Washington DC stage for the first time, to premiere this ambitious new commission on February 1st, the ancient festival of Imbolc, to celebrate rebirth, renewal, the coming of Spring and the symbol of feminine energy.

Maija Sofia is a songwriter and artist from rural Galway. Her debut album 'Bath Time' was released in November 2019 through Trapped Animal Records. By turns arresting, intimate and strange, her songs are built around striking electric guitar, intricate lyrics, harp, analogue synth and more experimental instrumentation. The album was critically lauded as the arrival of a poignant, original new talent, receiving full-mark reviews and a nomination for the RTE Choice Award Irish Album of the Year. It was described in the Sunday Times as "quietly breathtaking [...] the arrival of a unique new voice."

She doesn't occupy an easily identifiable space - there are few genres which could accurately pinpoint her sound - and the ease with which she weaves grand tales of mythos into short and delicate folk tunes suggests a true finesse. Her subject matter is seldom trivial - abuse, mythological stories, feminism and loss are considered with a confident serenity..'

It's a week before the opening of a new Irish play on Broadway and in the rehearsal room, the cast are panicking. The writer's previous play was a smash hit, a drama set in Northern Ireland during the Troubles. She's been commissioned off the back of it and the producers expect another instant classic. Except her new play is about sexual harassment and talking seagulls. The cast are worried the script is dated, too weird and nowhere near Irish enough for American audiences. When the writer comes into the rehearsal room to watch a run, an argument erupts and the fate of the script hangs in the balance. Not wanting to blow their shot on Broadway, the cast feel it is now their duty to devise an "Irish Play". *Irishtown* is a biting satire about theatre, consent and what it means to be Irish.

Join us for an afternoon with a new play read by some of DC's most talented performers, followed by a post-show discussion with Artistic Director of Theatre, Rex Daugherty. Chatting with audiences about the new scripts in the Play Reading Series is one of the most direct ways our community informs what shows we choose for full production. Solas Nua's annual *Capital Irish Film Festival*, now in its 17th year, presents the best of contemporary Irish cinema by filmmakers from the Republic of Ireland and Northern Ireland to audiences in the D.C. metropolitan area. We are delighted to present the festival in partnership with the American Film Institute at their east coast home in the historic art deco Silver Theatre & Cultural Center, in Silver Spring, MD.

The four day festival showcases the latest Irish dramatic and documentary features, shorts, art films and animation releases, and we accept official submissions via Film Freeway. The 2023 festival will highlight Irish language, social change, migration and Northern Ireland. We are delighted to feature Soilsiú Films' Award-winning documentary Young Plato, an inspiring and uplifting documentary about a Northern Ireland School Principal's efforts to interrupt the intergenerational trauma in the lives of his young pupils through the teaching of philosophy. We are excited to also introduce new programming strands including family oriented and experimental art films.

In 2023 short filmmakers from or living in Northern Ireland will automatically be entered into the running for the Norman Houston Short Film Award - an annual honor for the best new short film created by a filmmaker based in or from Northern Ireland. The Norman Houston Short Film Award is part of the Norman Houston Project - a project initiated by Solas Nua in Washington D.C., dedicated to the memory of Norman Houston, the former Director of the Northern Ireland Bureau (NIB), in the United States.

The Capital Irish Film Festival is supported by Culture Ireland, Screen Ireland, the Northern Ireland Bureau and the Embassy of Ireland.


